

A reflection from U.S.-Mexico border By Mary Bjork

For the past two weeks I've been volunteering at Oscar Romero House in El Paso, Texas. The former shelter for victims of domestic violence is now a hospitality house for refugees who've been released by United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to join their families.

The house, which opened in February, is one of several hospitality houses under the auspices of Annunciation House, which was started in 1978 by lay Catholics. It sees an average of 70 new people a day, and guests stay until travel arrangements can be made by their families.

I, along with two traveling companions, have been staying at Columban House, which hosts Border Awareness Weeks for various groups. St. Joan of Arc Church in Minneapolis sent a group before we arrived, and while here two college groups have come through.

The experience has been rich, enhanced especially by the relationships that have been formed, even though temporary. And, I've never worked so hard in any other volunteer experience, or felt so useful.

Volunteers do a variety of tasks, which essentially revolve around whatever is needed at any given moment. The options include helping guests find clothes from the clothing room, passing out toiletries, preparing lunch bags for their travels and taking guests to the bus station or airport. Volunteers who are bilingual also help with intake.

The needs are great, and we've heard stories of border patrol personnel taking crutches, medicine, shoelaces, diapers, baby formula and more. The experience upon arrival at the border for refugees seems to be more traumatic than the journey itself.

Still, the guests we've served have been so appreciative. And, in support of one another, they cook all the meals for the other guests.





The Love Your Neighbor Team presents the "Who is My Neighbor?" FILM SERIES

"The shortest distance between two people is a story." ~ Patti Digh

In February, the Love Your Neighbor Team hosted a "State of the Heart" coffee hour with shared stories about love - of, by, and for - our neighbors. That conversation was a prelude to a film series that answers the question "Who is my neighbor?" with stories that can cross the distance between us and the neighbors we don't yet know. The films are recommended for adult audiences.

The question posed by the film series, "Who Is My Neighbor?" isn't just a matter of curiosity, it's a matter of Christian love. It's a pathway to meeting new neighbors so we can love them as ourselves.

The series includes three films beginning during Lent and continuing into early May that are filled with tough, searching questions concerning faith, discrimination, imprisonment, and the search for home, hope, and community. They invite a wealth of Lenten reflections as we ponder what Jesus taught about connecting to one another in the name of love.

As we view the films together, will we be able to recognize our young adult selves in a street kid whose language and culture are a world away from our own as he tries to make sense of his life and do the right thing? Or better understand the lasting sting of hateful, ignorant judgement that is familiar territory for our neighbors of color, and do something about it? Or imagine ourselves in the bleak isolation of prison life and feel the uplifting power that poetry and language bring to incarcerated writers? Experiencing these stories with curiosity, respect, and empathy will open us to the connections that the series is all about.

These are films from independent film makers that are rarely offered in a small-town setting like ours, and we're excited to share them.

Please! Come to the films and invite your friends. These will be public events held at People's Church, and the presence of People's people will tell our guests and the St. Croix Valley that we mean it when we say we are a church that's built upon inclusivity and welcome.

We warmly invite you to subscribe to the series. The events are free, but optional series subscriptions (\$20 per person) will help us cover film licensing and other costs. With 30 subscriptions we'll just about break even, and more will allow us to increase our support for the important work of our special series guests.


