A Congregational UCC Way of Life Adult Faith Conversations | Jan. 14 & 21, 11:00-11:45am (childcare provided)

We launched as St. Croix United Church in October 2023. St. Peter's United Church of Christ (UCC) was a long-standing member of the MN Conference UCC. People's Congregational Church was a long-standing member of the National Association of Christian Congregational Churches (NACCC) and added an affiliation with the MN Conference UCC in May 2023. Now we are a dually affiliated congregation.

In February & March, a Strategic Vision Task Force will lead us in distilling our core values, creating vision & mission statements, and designing a visual logo for our church. (Please contact Jill Greenhalgh or Pastor Clare if you'd like to serve on this task force - we will soon meet for a first planning session!)

Across the next two Sundays, our adult Faith Formation Team invites members and friends into fuller understanding of what our dual affiliation means for us. What commonalities and differences exist between the UCC and NACCC? What resources do we gain (for doing our particular ministry in the St. Croix valley) by being connected within larger networks of churches? Many of us come from Baptist, Roman Catholic, Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Unitarian and other religious and non-religious roots. All perspectives and questions are welcome!

*We offer gratitude for Frank Cole's grandson Willy Christou's vital work as a journalist in Lebanan and thanksgiving for his ongoing safety and wellbeing. Willy wrote an article that was picked up globally and quoted by the New York Times, The Guardian, and the Times of Israel, etc. He had located spent shells used by the IDF to target civilians with white phosphorus, traced the shells, and published an article in the Washington Post about Israel's war crime. The article was referenced by a reporter at a White House news conference. Willy was also recently interviewed on the BBC Newshour. (The articles and interview are linked in the Mid-Week News.)

*Safe travels for Aidan Gromoll on January 7-8. She departs for Magura, Bangladesh to open and run a medical clinic for persons with limited or no access to medical care. The clinic will be above a newly opened school in a community center recently built by a humanitarian friend.






