Minnesota FoodShare Month - ends on Easter, March 31st!



As the largest grassroots fundraiser in the state, the MN FoodShare Campaign brings together individuals, community organizations, businesses, and faith communities to help nearly 300 food shelves statewide.

Our local community food shelf, Valley Outreach, is the only nonprofit in the St. Croix Valley/Stillwater, MN area that provides people with a wide range of support – whether they need food, clothing, or help navigating resources during challenging times.
